• Recycling in C'ville

- Unfortunately, plastic numbers 3-7 are no longer (as of April 2020) accepted in Charlottesville. The city still recycles other products, like aluminum, glass, and paper. This is because of China's ban on imports of this kind of product.
- The University recycles all plastics, paper, aluminum, and glass. Your best bet to recycle plastic is to bring it on-Grounds to one of the many recycling bins in University buildings.

Composting

 You can bring compost to the McIntire Recycling Center, and some apartments close to Grounds even offer this in their normal waste services.

Local Energy Alliance Program (LEAP)

- LEAP is a "non-profit that matches Charlottesville residents with the best programs, contractors, and financing options available in your area." You can get valuable home upgrades like energy efficiency and solar panels – customized to your needs and budget.
- If you fall into a particular financial bracket (which most students do) you can qualify for energy upgrades to your home.
 This mostly applies to those living in houses, and the landlord/owner of the house will need to be involved.
